

**Seabird Incident Report 2025**

Seabirds naturally gravitate towards farm structures as a perching ground and source of food, although we endeavor to prevent fatalities, they unfortunately can occur.

However, through responsible management and best practice operations, we strive to farm our King salmon in harmony with the natural environment and with minimal negative impacts on local wildlife.

All fatal seabird incidents are notified on our website within 30 days of the occurrence.
